COURSE DESCRIPTION and OBJECTIVES

This course introduces the principles of music within the context of contemporary commercial music. Aural and written skills will be developed through listening, singing, transcription, and keyboard exercises. Topics include rhythm notation, time and key signatures, scales, intervals, chords and their inversions, and song form. Students who have passed MUTH 1110 or equivalent with a grade of C or better may not enroll in RIM 1230 for credit.

REQUIRED MATERIALS

- Access to a polyphonic MIDI Keyboard Controller or piano with at least 32 keys.
- Access to high-quality headphones or speakers (with minimum 30 Hz 16 kHz frequency response).
- Access to a laptop or phone with audio and video recording capability.

ATTENDANCE

This is an in-person, on-ground class; it is not an online, remote, or hybrid class. Regular attendance is expected. Attendance affects a student's final course grade in the following ways:

0 – 2 absences	:	Three bonus points will be added to the student's overall course grade

There is no distinction between excused and unexcused absences. Three late arrivals or early exists count as a full absence. Extenuating circumstances will need to be authorized through the DAC (discussed below).

Cell phones and other personal electronic devices such as laptop computers must be turned off during class. Unauthorized use of personal electronic equipment during class counts as a full unexcused absence.

To be clear: The highest grades listed above are not deductions to a student's overall grade but rather impose limits on the highest possible letter grade that can be earned. For example, if a student's raw overall course grade is a 94% and they have missed 10 days of class, that student will be given a B in the course. If a student's raw overall course grade is an 84% and they have missed 10 days of class, that student will also be given a B in the course. If a student's raw overall course grade is a 74% and they have missed 10 days of class, that student will be given a C in the course.
